

This document is a recreation that I tried, in every way possible, to stay faithful to the original design, layout, and styles.

The recreation was done in Adobe's Creative Suite 5, including:

- Photoshop Photo restoration
- Illustrator Front Cover Battalion Crest Recreation Graphic
- Indesign Document layout
- Acrobat Pro OCR (Optical Character Recognition) and PDF File
- Agfa 1236 Snapscan Cathode Tube Flatbed Scanner

I scanned each page as line art at 600 ppi for two reasons. First, so they could used as background templates for the page layouts. And second, scanning as Line Art provides a straight black and white image eliminating any grays that "fuzz-up" the text. I then created a temporary PDF file of each page that had the original text and used the Adobe Acrobat Pro Optical Character Recognition feature to create text that could be copied and pasted into a text file to be later imported into the InDesign book layout. This may seem to be a rather laborious effort, however the thought of typing all the text in this book by hand seemed to be an even more daunting task.

The photographs were individually scanned and presented a problem in their own rights. Photos that are printed go through a process called half toning that breaks the image down into a series of small dots. That way subtle gradations and solid colors don't clump into indistinguishable blobs.

These images were scanned in Grayscale mode at 200 lines per/inch, and at 1200 ppi resolution to reduce the Moiré pattern created by those dots. The pattern is still discernible in some images, but for the most part with some contrast and clarity adjustments in Photoshop, I think they came out pretty well.

There were only two actual changes made to enhance the document. The first change is on the cover page. The firs line read: 3d Missile Battalion... I changed it to 3rd Missile Battalion....

The second change is on the first photograph montage page. At the top of that page was a typed line "Yesterday...". I don't know what happened, but half of that line was cut off at the top. I suspect that the photo montage layout was larger than the 8.5 x 11 page, and they just lopped it off. So I cleaned up the background and added Yesterday...again, but moved it down a bit so the whole word could be read. Also, in the paragraphs, the words don't always fit the way first done. Scalable font types are not the same, but with the various InDesign tweaking methods, I tried to come as close as I could to the original.

And finally, we want to acknowledge and give full credit to the original crew who produced this publication: Published by the 3d Missile Battalion, 71st Artillery, Kornwestheim, Germany. Responsible Officer: Captain Julius P. Johnston Jr., Editor: SP5 Jonathan Knowles, Assistant Editor: Jasper W. Jordan, Illustrations: SP4 Bert J. Walton, Covers: SP4 James A. Lewis.

We hope you all enjoy this rather rare and interesting piece of our battalion history.



History

The lineage of the 3d Missile Battalion, 71st Artillery goes back more than forty-five years to 12 May 1918 when Battery C, 71st Artillery (Coast Artillery Corps) was organized in the Regular Army at Fort Andrews, Massachusetts. Shortly after the first world war, the unit was demobilized, and it was not until 1 July 1940 that it was reconstituted in the Regular Army as Battery C, 71st Coast Artillery (AA). On 1 September 1943, reorganization and redesignation led to the formation of Battery C, 71st AA Gun Battalion.

During World War II, the "3d of the 71st" earned battle honors, through the 552d AAA Gun Battalion, for the Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes-Alsace, and Central Europe campaigns. Inactivation followed the second world war, but in 1949 the unit was reactivated at Fort Bliss, Texas. From then until 1958, the unit was designated Battery C, 71st AA Missile Battalion.

On 12 August 1958, the organic elements of the battalion were constituted and on 17 August Battery B became the first Nike-Ajax battery in the battalion to be declared operational. The organization was then transferred, on 1 September 1958, less personnel and equipment, from Lorton, Virginia to Germany. Concurrently, the 552d AAA Gun Battalion in Germany was redesignated as the 3d Missile Battalion, 71st Artillery. This link with the 552d established the 3d Missile Battalion, as Colonel Leech mentions, as one of the oldest continuously-active air defense battalions in the defense of Western Europe. At that time the battalion commander was Lieutenant Colonel Philip J. Corso and the battalion consisted of the line batteries A, B, C, D, and Hq & Hq Battery, all at temporary sites.

In the opening months of its existence, the 3d Missile Battalion started out on the right foot by winning the 32d Artillery Brigade Safety Award for the period 1 March 1958 - 28 February 1959. Also during this period the problems associated with establishing and maintaining operational readiness of such complex equipment as missiles and radar were ironed out, and procedures were conceived and tested for activities like readiness tests, Annual Service Practice, visits and displays, and field exercises like "Top Weight", "Side Step", and "Bright Light". Meanwhile, Lieutenant Colonel Tippett had become battalion commander upon the reassignment of Lt Col Corso.

Following this period, three battery moves to permanent sites took place. In July and August 1959, Hq & Hq Battery, Btry B, and Btry C moved to sites near Gross Sachsenheim, Kleingartach, and Kornwestheim. Late in 1959 the battalion came under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Jack C. Maldonado.

In the early months of 1960 the battalion gave indication of the laurels it was to win when the 32d Artillery Brigade Commanders Trophy was presented to the battalion for operational readiness from 1 January 1960 to 30 June 1960.


In March of 1960, the battalion came under the command of Seventh Army, and in July occurred the first of many 7th Army Command Maintenance Inspections to come. During the summer of 1960 the 3d Missile Battalion gave indication of another area in which it was to excel as SFC Byron Ray, the battalion Career Counselor, received the Brigade Commanders Trophy for the highest battalion reenlistment rate from 1 August 1959 to 30 June 1960.

STAFF SECTIONS

The commanding officer of the 3d Missile Battalion is Lieutenant Colonel Ralph P. Kennedy. Lt Col Kennedy, a resident of La Jolla, California, attended Central State



Teacher's College and San Diego State College in his home state, completing the B. A. and M. A. degrees respectively. During World War II, he served with the Second Marine Division, participating in the landings at Guadalcanal, Tulagi, Saipan-Tinian, and Okinawa. Previous assignments include a tour in Germany from 1951 through 1954 with the 62d AAAW Battalion and with KMAG in Korea. Prior to his assignment to Germany, Lt Col Kennedy was stationed in San Diego as a National Guard Advisor to the 40th Armored Division.

Major William R. Morgan has been the Battalion Executive Officer since 1 July 1962. During his current tour, he has also served as Battalion S·3, and as Commanding Officer of Battery D. Major Morgan attended the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Georgia, and received his commission 14 Feb 46. He served as an enlisted man in World War II and took part in seven campaigns during the Korean Conflict. He attended High School in Danville, Illinois, and the University of Illinois at Urbana. Prior to his assignment to Germany, Major Morgan was assigned to the Staff and Faculty, US Army Air Defense School.

Captain Julius P. Johnston has served with the battalion since 30 Oct 60 as Motor Officer, S-4, and Adjutant. He came to the battalion from the 108th Artillery Group, Fort MacArthur, California, where he was assigned as Group S-3. Captain Johnston served as a Warrant Officer (Reconnaissance) in the Pacific with the 369th AAA Gun Battalion during World War II and took part in the 3d Winter and Summer-Fall 1953 campaigns in Korea. Captain Johnston is a resident of New York City.



signment prior to his arrival in Germany was as Operations Sergeant, 80th Art Group, Fort Wadsworth, New York.




The missilemen of Delta Battery outscored those of every other battery in the 32d Artillery Brigade during the spring Annual Service Practice, and in September, 1960, Captain Partridge, the Battery Commander, accepted the Commanders Trophy on behalf of the men in "the Best Ajax Battery". Shortly thereafter the battalion became fully universal as Batteries A and D received universal equipment.

Throughout the remainder of the year and in 1961 the battalion continued to enlarge its visits and display program. Battery B was the host site for most visits because of the proximity of the Battalion Operations Central. In addition to visits by numerous foreign dignitaries, visits were made by Brig Gen Perry, CG, 7th Army Artillery; Brig Gen Ryan, CG, VII Corps Artillery; Lt Gen Davidson, CG, 7th Army; Col Murray, Hq, Allied AFCENT; Col Light, CO, 10th Artillery Group; Lt Col Kelley, USAF; Col

Armed Forces Day; at Oberschleissheim Airport, for the Quarterly NATO Weapons Demonstration; and at the Fest Grounds, Ludwigsburg.

Lieutnant Colonel Thomas O. Hindman became the fourth battalion commander on 15 April 1961, replacing Lt Col Maldonado.

In the spring of 1961 all batteries had participated in Annual Service Practice at McGregor Range, New Mexico, and it was announced that batteries B and D had done exceptionally well, receiving scores in excess of 2900 points, out of a possible 3000. On 15 May 1962, Battery D received the initial award of the Paul Henri Spaak Trophy, awarded to the NATO battery attaining the highest score in Annual Service Practice. The battalion completed a sweep of the top battery honors in 1962 as Battery B garnered second place laurels. Accepting the trophies



Anderson, MAG, USAREUR; and Mr. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr. An unusually large number of groups also paid visits during this time, including a group from the Special Weapons School, Oberammergau; the wives of fourteen battalion officers; eight Italian Air Force officers; seventy members of the German-American Club "Stammtisch"; one hundred NATO officers; forty-three officers from the French War College; six German Air Force officers; and twelve officers of the Royal Canadian Air Force. Visits usually consisted of unclassified tours of launcher, IFC, and administrative areas, with briefings and drills in selected areas.

Also during this period, Nike-Ajax and Nike-Hercules missiles, with launcher equipment and crews, were put on display at Patch Barracks on the 10th anniversary (since reactivation) of 7th Army; in Bad Cannstatt, during German-American Week; at Fontainbleu, France, on

on behalf of the battery were the Delta Battery CO, Captain Charles C. Clarke, Jr, and the Bravo Battery CO, Captain Norman E. Sliva. Visiting dignitaries included the Han. Dirk U. Stikker, Secretary-General, NATO; Air Chief Marshal the Earl of Bandon, CIC, Allied AFCENT; Gen Samuel Anderson, Air Deputy to the Supreme Allied Commander, Europe; French Lt Gen R. V. Marias, Vice Commander, 4th ATAF; Lt Gen Derivals, Chief of Air Defense, AIRCENT; Lt Gen John C. Oakes, CG, 7th Army; and Brig Gen William A. Harris, CG, 7th Army Artillery.

Major Kenneth D. Stempson assumed command of the battalion late in June upon the departure of Lt Col Hindman for assignment in USARADCOM. The 7th Army Annual General Inspection and Command Maintenance Inspection in all batteries and the 195 Ordnance Detachment followed in July, and the results were "Very Satisfactory".

Upon the departure of Major Stempson, Major William R. Morgan, Executive Officer of the battalion, assumed command pending the arrival of Lieutenant Colonel Ralph P. Kennedy, who became battalion commander 11 December 1962.

The battalion added to its ASP honors on 26 January 1963, when battery C was awarded the 94th Artillery Group Commanders Trophy for outstanding performance during the 1962 Annual Service Practice. Battery C, under the command of Captain John R. Pipkin, at-

last of the moves to a permanent site was completed, when Battery A moved from the Kornwestheim area to its new location near Speyer. The site featured many improvements, including ready rooms in both areas and an entirely new design in the layout of the administrative buildings.

In May 1963 evidence of the continued good relations between Germans and Americans was seen in the large attendance of 5000 at an Open House at Battery B climaxing German-American Friendship Week. In addition



tained the highest score in the 94th Artillery Group with a percent score of 97.1.

Under the leadership of battalion career counselor, Sergeant Eddie L. Ealey, the battalion reenlistment program continued in high gear as battery reenlistment NCO's won the 94th Artillery Group Semi Annual Reenlistment Award from January - June 1963. MSG Clifford D. Eggemeyer and Battery D were high within the battalion in the fiscal year 1963, during which seventyeight battalion men reenlisted. On 25 April 1963, the

to displays of missiles in the launcher area and equipment in the IFC area, on view were helicopters, tanks, and guns from nearby German and American units.

The twentieth anniversary of Seventh Army was celebrated 10 July 1963, and the 3d Missile Battalion was given the honor of representing the 32d Artillery Brigade. Sixty men from each battery participated in the anniversary parade, which was held at Neckar Stadium, Bad Cannstatt. Very favorable comments were received on the appearance of the troops.

Hq & Hq Battery


Wilkin Barracks, Kornwestheim, is the home of Headquarters & Headquarters Battery, whose mission is the support of the firing batteries of the battalion. At present, the missilemen share a barracks with the lately-arrived 651 st Medical Company, which replaced the personnel of Battery A after the latter's move to the Geinsheim area.


Manning the battalion headquarters staff sections is the job of most of the men assigned to Headquarters Battery, while a small group is on temporary duty at the Battalion Operations Central. In addition to the S1, S2, S3, Missile, and S4 sections, the personnel, chaplain, communications, reenlistment, public information, and battalion maintenance sections are located at Wilkin Barracks.

Since arriving at Wilkin, two major moves of the battalion staff offices have occurred, the most recent being in May 1963. In addition to the improvements made during these moves, extensive painting and carpentry were carried out under former battery commander Major Richard C. Lowry in the mess hall, billets, and staff offices. The carpenters were PFC John H. Cunningham, Jr, and SP4 Bert J. Walton; while helping out on other projects were SP4 Edward I. Pray, Jr, SP4 Robert K. Miller, and PFC Gerald D. Hughes.



Although Headquarters Battery does not get a chance to prove itself in missile competition, it has shown itself the match of the other batteries in the battalion in inspections, athletic contests, and Soldier of the Month competition. tery remained the same: to provide the firing components in the missile air defense of Western Germany.

After the comparatively crowded conditions existing at the old site, the new one offered considerably more breathing space. Battery A also has won accolades for its high standing in the battalion savings program and for the record of five battery officers at the Nike-Hercules Warhead Prefire Course at Oberammergau in averaging over 90 percent scores as a group. The officers still with the battery who participated are 1st Lt Edward H. Langston, Jr, 1st Lt David A. Traugott, 2d Lt Mark T. Peyton, and 2d Lt Cester J. Whitaker. In addition the performance of Sergeant Samuel N. Kersey, SP4 Robert A. Reynolds, and PFC Barrie J. Brown in pistol competition has won praise. Battery A captured the three top honors among thirty-six contestants in a 3d Missile Battalion competition and Sergeant Kersey participated in the 94th Artillery Group team, which placed second in the Seventh Army Support Command Championships.

The battery commander is Captain Thomas R. Livingston and 1SG Kenneth R. Cagle is the top NCO in the battery.







Soldier of the Month honors for Battery C in a four-month period in 1962.






BATTERY D



Located near Pforzheim, Battery D has achieved an excellent record in several phases of activity since the battalion was constituted on 1 September 1958.



Captain William A. B. Hanchett, who arrived in February 1963, commands the battery and 1SG Charles J. Murphy is the first sergeant.



195TH ORDNANCE DETACHMENT







